Monologues

#1. Scrooge: I wish to be left alone. Since you ask me what I wish, that is my answer. I don't make merry myself at Christmas, and I can't afford to make idle people merry. I help support the establishments I have mentioned...they cost enough...and those who are badly off must go there. And if they would rather die than go there, they had better do it, and decrease the surplus population. It's enough for a man to understand his own business, and not to interfere with other people's. Mine occupies me constantly. Good afternoon!

#2. Belle: Ebenezer, dance with me! Please, dance with me! *(beat)* Oh, I matter little to you now, very little. Another idol has replaced me. A golden one. There is nothing which gives you such passion as money. When we were engaged, we were both poor, but we were happy. Regardless of wealth, it's better to be happy. You are changed. You were another man then. While you've never tried to break our engagement in words, you have broken it in your changed nature, in your altered spirit. In everything that made my love of any value in your sight. So, I release you from your promise.

#3. Marley: Man of the worldly mind, do you believe in me or not? It is required of every man that the spirit within him should walk among his fellow men, and travel far and wide; and if that spirit goes not forth in life, it is condemned to do so after death. It is doomed to wander through the world and witness what it cannot share, but might have shared on earth, and turned to happiness. I wear the chain I forged in life. I made it link by link, and yard by yard. Would you know the weight and length of the strong coil you bear yourself? It was as heavy and long as this seven years ago. You have labored on it since! It is a ponderous chain!

#4. Mrs. Cratchit: What has ever got your precious father then? And your brother, Tiny Tim; and Martha warn't as late last Christm...Oh Martha, you're here! Why, bless your heart alive, my dear Martha, how late you are! Well, never mind so long as you are here. Sit down before the fire, my dear. You father and Tiny Time will be along. Some days I think he's doing better, but others I am not all too sure. But we do what we must to keep our spirits high.

#5. **Bob Cratchit:** Merry Christmas everyone! Martha, dear, we are so glad to have you! And heavens! What a goose! I do not believe there has ever been such a tender and flavorful goose cooked in all the days of the world! And oh, what a wonderful looking pudding! Emily, my love, what a masterpiece you have create! Everyone sit down, sit down...let us eat...but before we do, dear family, a toast! To Mr. Scrooge, the founder of the feast!

#6. Fan: Ebenezer! I have come to bring you home, dear brother! Yes! Home, for good and forever and ever. Father is so much kinder than he used to be, that home's like Heaven! He spoke so gently to me one night when I was going to bed, that I was not afraid to ask him once more if you might come home; and he said yes, you should; and sent me in a coach to bring you. And we're to be all together and have the merriest Christmas in all the world! Come with me, dear brother...

#7. Fred: There are many things from which I have derived good but have not profited, Christmas being one of them. And I have always thought of Christmas time as a kind, forgiving, charitable, happy time. A time when men and women open their shut-up hearts to their fellow creatures. And though, uncle, it has never put a scrap of gold or silver in my pocket, I believe that it has done me a world of good. And I say, God bless it!

#8. Mrs. Cratchit: The founder of the feast? The founder of the feast indeed! I wish I had him here. I'd give him a piece of my mind to feast upon, and I hope he'd have a good appetite for it. It should be Christmas Day, I am sure, on which one drinks the health of such an odious, stingy, hard, unfeeling man as Mr. Scrooge. You know he is, Robert. Nobody knows it better than you do, poor fellow. I'll drink his health for your sake, and the Day's, not for his. Long life to him. A merry Christmas and a happy new year! –He'll be very merry and very happy; I have no doubt!
